Empowerment

Students will take more responsibility and control over their own learning

- spend more time working with classmates outside of class to prepare class assignments (OCCGRP)
- often discuss ideas from readings or classes with others outside of the class (OCCIDEAS)
- often work harder than they thought they could to meet an instructor's standards and expectations (WORKHARD)
- spend more time preparing for class (ACADPR01)

Inspiration

Students will more engaged with faculty outside the classroom

- often discuss ideas from readings or classes with faculty members outside of class (FACIDEAS)
- often work with faculty members on activities other than coursework (FACOTHER)
- plan to work on a research project with a faculty member outside of course or program requirements (RESRCH04)

Open to Experience

OCAD students will benefit from diversity

- often have serious conversations with students of a different race or ethnicity than their own (DIVRSTUD)
- often have serious conversations with students who are very different from them in terms of their religious beliefs, political opinions, or personal values (DIFFSTU2)

Self-directed

OCAD students will have more opportunities for enhanced learning.

- participate in a learning community (LRNCOM 04)
- have decided to undertake independent study or selfdesigned major (INDST04)
- plan to do a culminating senior experience (SNRX04)

In control

Students will have greater control of facets competing with academic life.

- paid work on campus (WORKOF01)
- a place on campus to relax and socialize (SOCIAL05)
- a virtual library that ameliorates distance and commuting time (COMMUTE)
- an efficient library service that maximizes the time that students spend on campus (ONT0608)


New Ecology of Learning Themes
